**STIPULATED ORDER FOR PERMANENT INJUNCTION
AND MONETARY JUDGMENT**

1 Plaintiff, the Federal Trade Commission (Commission or FTC), filed its
2 Complaint for Permanent Injunction and Other Equitable Relief (Complaint)
3 (Dkt #3), for a permanent injunction and other equitable relief in this matter,
4 pursuant to Sections 13(b) and 19 of the Federal Trade Commission Act (FTC
5 Act), 15 U.S.C. §§ 53(b) and 57b, Section 5 of the Restore Online Shoppers'
6 Confidence Act (ROSCA), 15 U.S.C. § 8404, and Section 917(c) of the Electronic
7 Funds Transfer Act (EFTA), 15 U.S.C. § 1693o(c). The Commission and
8 Stipulating Defendant Motti Nottea stipulate to the entry of this Stipulated Order
9 for Permanent Injunction and Monetary Judgment (Order) to resolve all matters in
10 dispute in this action between them.

11 THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED as follows:

12 **FINDINGS**

- 13 1. This Court has jurisdiction over this matter.
- 14 2. The Complaint charges that Stipulating Defendant and Defendants
15 participated in deceptive and unfair acts or practices in violation of Section 5 of
16 the FTC Act, 15 U.S.C. § 45, Section 4 of ROSCA, 15 U.S.C. § 8403, and Section
17 907(a) of EFTA, 15 U.S.C. § 1693e(a), in connection with the online sale of
18 skincare products through a negative option continuity plan.
- 19 3. Stipulating Defendant neither admits nor denies any of the allegations in
20 the Complaint related to Stipulating Defendant, except as specifically stated in this

1 Order. Only for purposes of this action, Stipulating Defendant admits the facts
2 necessary to establish jurisdiction.

3 4. Stipulating Defendant waives any claim that he may have under the Equal
4 Access to Justice Act, 28 U.S.C. § 2412, concerning the prosecution of this action
5 through the date of this Order, and agrees to bear his own costs and attorney fees.

6 5. Stipulating Defendant waives all rights to appeal or otherwise challenge or
7 contest the validity of this Order.

8 **DEFINITIONS**

9 For the purpose of this Order, the following definitions apply:

10 A. **“Acquirer”** means a business organization, financial institution, or an agent
11 of a business organization or financial institution that has authority from an
12 organization that operates or licenses a credit card system (*e.g.* Visa, MasterCard,
13 American Express, and Discover) to authorize merchants to accept, transmit, or
14 process payment by credit card through the credit card system for money, goods or
15 services, or anything else of value.

16 B. **“Charge”** or **“Charging”** means causing billing information to be
17 submitted for payment, including against a consumer’s credit card, debit card,
18 bank account, phone bill, or other account, or otherwise attempting to collect
19 money or other consideration.

1 C. “**Clear and conspicuous**” means that a required disclosure is difficult to
2 miss (*i.e.*, easily noticeable) and easily understandable by ordinary consumers,
3 including in all of the following ways:

4 1. In any communication that is solely visual or solely audible, the
5 disclosure must be made through the same means through which the
6 communication is presented. In any communication made through both visual and
7 audible means, such as a television advertisement, the disclosure must be
8 presented simultaneously in both the visual and audible portions of the
9 communication even if the representation requiring the disclosure is made in only
10 one means.

11 2. A visual disclosure, by its size, contrast, location, the length of time it
12 appears, and other characteristics, must stand out from any accompanying text or
13 other visual elements so that it is easily noticed, read, and understood.

14 3. An audible disclosure, including by telephone or streaming video,
15 must be delivered in a volume, speed, and cadence sufficient for ordinary
16 consumers to easily hear and understand it.

17 4. In any communication using an interactive electronic medium, such
18 as the Internet or software, the disclosure must be unavoidable.

19 5. On a product label, the disclosure must be presented on the principal
20 display panel.

1 6. The disclosure must use diction and syntax understandable to
2 ordinary consumers and must appear in each language in which the representation
3 that requires the disclosure appears.

4 7. The disclosure must comply with these requirements in each medium
5 through which it is received, including all electronic devices and face-to-face
6 communications.

7 8. The disclosure must not be contradicted or mitigated by, or
8 inconsistent with, anything else in the communication.

9 9. When the representation or sales practice targets a specific audience,
10 such as children, the elderly, or the terminally ill, “ordinary consumers” includes
11 reasonable members of that group.

12 D. **“Credit Card Laundering”** means:

13 1. Presenting or depositing into, or causing or allowing another to
14 present or deposit into, the credit card system for payment, a Credit Card Sales
15 Draft generated by a transaction that is not the result of a credit card transaction
16 between the cardholder and the Stipulating Defendant;

17 2. Employing, soliciting, or otherwise causing or allowing a Merchant,
18 or an employee, representative, or agent of a Merchant, to present to or deposit
19 into the credit card system for payment, a Credit Card Sales Draft generated by a
20

1 transaction that is not the result of a credit card transaction between the cardholder
2 and the Merchant; or

3 3. Obtaining access to the credit card system through the use of a
4 business relationship or an affiliation with a Merchant, when such access is not
5 authorized by the Merchant Account agreement or the applicable credit card
6 system.

7 E. **“Credit Card Sales Draft”** means any record or evidence of a credit card
8 transaction.

9 F. **“Continuity Plan”** means any plan, arrangement, or system in
10 which a consumer is periodically charged for products or services *without* prior
11 notification by the seller before each charge.

12 G. **“Defendants”** means all of the Individual Defendants and the Corporate
13 Defendants, individually, collectively, or in any combination.

14 1. **“Corporate Defendants”** means Bunzai Media Group, Inc., d/b/a
15 AuraVie and Miracle Face Kit; Pinnacle Logistics, Inc.; DSA Holdings, Inc.;
16 Lifestyle Media Brands, Inc.; Agoa Holdings, Inc.; Zen Mobile Media, Inc.;
17 Safehaven Ventures, Inc.; Heritage Alliance Group, Inc., also doing business as
18 AuraVie Distribution; AMD Financial Network, Inc.; SBM Management, Inc.;
19 Media Urge, Inc.; Adageo, LLC; Calenergy, Inc.; KAI Media, Inc.; Insight Media,
20 Inc.; Focus Media Solutions, Inc.; Secured Commerce, LLC; Secured Merchants,

1 LLC; USM Products, Inc.; Merchant Leverage Group, Inc.; DMA Media Holding,
2 Inc.; Shalita Holdings, Inc.; All Star Beauty Products, Inc. and their successors
3 and assigns.

4 2. **“Individual Defendants”** mean Alon Nottea, Motti Nottea, Doron
5 Nottea, Igor Latsanovski, Oz Mizrahi, Roi Reuveni, Kristopher Bond a/k/a Ray
6 Ibbot, Alan Argaman, and Paul Medina individually, collectively, or in any
7 combination.

8 3. **“Stipulating Defendant”** means Motti Nottea.

9 H. **“Electronic Fund Transfer”** means any transfer of funds, other than a
10 transaction originated by check, draft, or similar paper instrument, which is
11 initiated through an electronic terminal, telephonic instrument, or computer or
12 magnetic tape so as to order, instruct, or authorize a financial institution to debit or
13 credit an account. Such term includes point-of-sale transfers, automated teller
14 machine transactions, direct deposits or withdrawals of funds, and transfers
15 initiated by telephone. Such term does not include:

16 1. Any check guarantee or authorization service that does not directly
17 result in a debit or credit to a consumer’s account;

18 2. Any transfer of funds, other than those processed by automated
19 clearinghouse, made by a financial institution on behalf of a consumer by means
20 of a service that transfers funds held at either Federal Reserve banks or other

1 depository institutions and that is not designed primarily to transfer funds on
2 behalf of a consumer;

3 3. Any transaction the primary purpose of which is the purchase or sale
4 of securities or commodities through a broker-dealer registered with or regulated
5 by the Securities and Exchange Commission;

6 4. Any automatic transfer from a savings account to a demand deposit
7 account pursuant to an agreement between a consumer and a financial institution
8 for the purpose of covering an overdraft or maintaining an agreed upon minimum
9 balance in the consumer's demand deposit account; or

10 5. Any transfer of funds which is initiated by a telephone conversation
11 between a consumer and an officer or employee of a financial institution which is
12 not pursuant to a prearranged plan and under which periodic or recurring
13 transfers are not contemplated.

14 I. "**Material**" means likely to affect a person's choice of, or conduct
15 regarding, goods or services.

16 J. "**Merchant**" means a person who is authorized under a written contract with
17 an Acquirer to honor or accept credit cards, or to transmit or process for payment
18 credit card payments, for the purchase of goods or services.

19 K. "**Merchant Account**" means an account with an Acquirer that authorizes
20 and allows a Merchant to honor or accept credit cards, or to transmit or process for

1 payment credit card payments, for the purchase of goods or services or a
2 charitable contribution.

3 L. **“Negative Option Feature”** means, in an offer or agreement to sell or
4 provide any good or service, a provision under which the consumer’s silence or
5 failure to take an affirmative action to reject a good or service or to cancel the
6 agreement is interpreted by the seller or provider as acceptance or continuing
7 acceptance of the offer or agreement.

8 M. **“Preauthorized Electronic Fund Transfer”** as defined by the Electronic
9 Fund Transfer Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1693a(10), means an electronic fund transfer
10 authorized in advance to recur at substantially regular intervals.

11 N. **“Receiver”** means Charlene Koonce, the person appointed by the Court in
12 this matter pursuant to the Temporary Restraining Order and the Preliminary
13 Injunction.

14 **ORDER**

15 **I. BAN ON NEGATIVE OPTION SALES**

16 IT IS ORDERED that Stipulating Defendant is permanently restrained and
17 enjoined from advertising, marketing, promoting, or offering for sale any good or
18 service with a Negative Option Feature, whether directly or through an
19 intermediary, including by consulting, planning, participating, facilitating or
20 advising.

1 5. Any material restriction, limitation, or condition to purchase, receive,
2 or use goods or services that are the subject of a sales offer;

3 B. Before a customer consents to pay for such good or service, failing to
4 disclose, or assisting others in failing to disclose, in a clear and conspicuous
5 manner all material terms and conditions of any refund or cancellation policies,
6 including:

- 7 1. The specific steps and means by which such requests must be
8 submitted;
- 9 2. The customer service telephone number that a customer must call to
10 cancel or return goods or services;
- 11 3. The email address, web address, or street address to which such
12 requests must be directed;
- 13 4. Any mechanism that customers must use to return any goods or
14 services, including any requirement for specific tracking methods or
15 delivery confirmation for a package;
- 16 5. If there is any policy of not making refunds or cancellations,
17 including any requirement that a product will not be accepted for
18 return or refund unless it is unopened and in re-sellable condition, a
19 statement regarding this policy;
- 20 6. The date by which a customer is required to request a refund;

1 C. Misrepresenting, or assisting others in misrepresenting, expressly or by
2 implication, any fact material, including:

- 3 1. That a good or service is free, a bonus, a gift, a trial, without cost;
- 4 2. That a good or service is available for a minimal processing, service,
5 or administrative fee or without further obligation;
- 6 3. That a purchase is “risk free” or offered with a satisfaction guarantee
7 or money-back guarantee;
- 8 4. That the seller is accredited or rated favorably by the Better Business
9 Bureau;
- 10 5. A seller’s affiliation with, or endorsement or sponsorship by, any
11 person or entity;
- 12 6. The amount that a consumer’s credit or debit card will be charged
13 and the timing of the charge(s);
- 14 7. That a transaction has been authorized by a consumer;
- 15 8. The dates that any limited time sales offer begins and ends;
- 16 9. The requirements or terms of the seller’s refund or cancellation
17 policies;
- 18 10. The identity of the seller, including the seller’s name, physical
19 address, and customer service telephone number;
- 20

1 11. The total costs to purchase, receive, or use, and the quantity of, any
2 goods or services that are the subject of the sales offer;

3 12. Any material restriction, limitation, or condition to purchase, receive,
4 or use goods or services that are the subject of a sales offer;

5 13. Any material aspect of the performance, efficacy, nature, or central
6 characteristics of a good or service;

7 D. Providing false information to any bank or other billing entity, directly or
8 indirectly, to contest a consumer's request for a refund, cancellation, chargeback,
9 or reversal of payment;

10 E. Failing to obtain a consumer's express informed consent by causing billing
11 information to be submitted for payment, or collecting or attempting to collect
12 payment for goods or services without the consumer's express verifiable
13 authorization, which shall include: (a) the customer's signature, including an
14 electronic or digital form of signature that is recognized as a valid signature under
15 federal law; or (b) express oral authorization that is audio-recorded and made
16 available to the customer and the customer's bank or other billing entity and that
17 evidences clearly both the customer's authorization of payment and the
18 customer's receipt of the following information: (i) The number of debits,
19 charges, or payments (if more than one); (ii) the date(s) the debit(s), charge(s), or
20 payment(s) will be submitted for payment; (iii) the amounts of the debit(s),

1 charge(s), or payment(s); (iv) the customer's name; (v) the customer's billing
2 information identified with sufficient specificity such that the customer
3 understands what account will be used to collect payment; (vi) identification of
4 the seller's name, physical address, and telephone number; (vii) the date of the
5 customer's oral authorization.;

6 F. Failing to obtaining written authorization signed or similarly authenticated
7 from consumers for Preauthorized Electronic Fund Transfers from the consumer's
8 account; or

9 G. Failing to provide a copy of a written authorization signed or similarly
10 authenticated by a consumer for Preauthorized Electronic Fund Transfers from the
11 consumer's account.

12 **III. PROHIBITIONS RELATED TO MERCHANT ACCOUNTS**

13 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Stipulating Defendant, Stipulating
14 Defendant's officers, agents, employees, and attorneys, and all other persons in
15 active concert or participation with any of them, who receive actual notice of this
16 Order, whether acting directly or indirectly, in connection with promoting or
17 offering for sale any good or service, are permanently restrained and enjoined
18 from Credit Card Laundering.

1 **IV. MONETARY JUDGMENT AND PARTIAL SUSPENSION**

2 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that:

3 A. Judgment in the amount of ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-TWO
4 THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED Dollars (\$182,500) is entered in favor of the
5 Commission against Stipulating Defendant as equitable monetary relief.

6 B. Stipulating Defendant is ordered to pay to the Commission TWENTY-
7 SEVEN THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FIVE DOLLARS
8 (\$27,835), which, as Stipulating Defendant stipulates, his undersigned counsel
9 holds in escrow for no purpose other than payment to the Commission. Such
10 payment must be made within 7 days of entry of this Order by electronic fund
11 transfer in accordance with instructions previously provided by a representative of
12 the Commission. Upon such payment, the remainder of the judgment is
13 suspended, subject to the Subsections below.

14 C. The Commission’s agreement to the suspension of part of the judgment is
15 expressly premised upon the truthfulness, accuracy, and completeness of
16 Stipulating Defendant’s sworn financial statements and related documents
17 (collectively, “financial representations”) submitted to the Commission, namely:

- 18 1. the Financial Statement of Individual Defendant Motti Nottea
19 signed on January 21, 2016, including the attachments;
20 2. the Financial Statement of Symbiotic Capital Group, LLC.,

1 signed on January 21, 2016, including the attachments; and

2 3. the Financial Statement of M3D, Inc., signed on January 21,
3 2016, including the attachments.

4 D. The suspension of the judgment will be lifted as to Stipulating Defendant
5 if, upon motion by the Commission, the Court finds that Stipulating Defendant
6 failed to disclose any material asset, materially misstated the value of any asset, or
7 made any other material misstatement or omission in the financial representations
8 identified above.

9 E. If the suspension of the judgment is lifted, the judgment becomes
10 immediately due as to Stipulating Defendant in the amount specified in
11 Subsection A above which the parties stipulate only for purposes of this Section
12 represents the Stipulating Defendant's unjust enrichment alleged in the Complaint,
13 less any payment previously made pursuant to this Section, plus interest computed
14 from the date of entry of this Order.

15 **V. ADDITIONAL MONETARY PROVISIONS**

16 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that:

17 A. Stipulating Defendant relinquishes dominion and all legal and equitable
18 right, title, and interest in all assets transferred pursuant to this Order and may not
19 seek the return of any assets.

1 B. The facts alleged in the Complaint will be taken as true, without further
2 proof, in any subsequent civil litigation by or on behalf of the Commission,
3 including in a proceeding to enforce its rights to any payment or monetary
4 judgment pursuant to this Order, such as a nondischargeability complaint in any
5 bankruptcy case.

6 C. The facts alleged in the Complaint establish all elements necessary to
7 sustain an action by the Commission pursuant to Section 523(a)(2)(A) of the
8 Bankruptcy Code, 11 U.S.C. § 523(a)(2)(A), and this Order will have collateral
9 estoppel effect for such purposes.

10 D. Stipulating Defendant acknowledges that his Taxpayer Identification
11 Number (Social Security Number or Employer Identification Number), which
12 Stipulating Defendant previously submitted to the Commission, may be used for
13 collecting and reporting on any delinquent amount arising out of this Order, in
14 accordance with 31 U.S.C. §7701.

15 E. All money paid to the Commission pursuant to this Order may be deposited
16 into a fund administered by the Commission or its designee to be used for
17 equitable relief, including consumer redress and any attendant expenses for the
18 administration of any redress fund. If a representative of the Commission decides
19 that direct redress to consumers is wholly or partially impracticable or money
20 remains after redress is completed, the Commission may apply any remaining

1 money for such other equitable relief (including consumer information remedies)
2 as it determines to be reasonably related to Defendants' practices alleged in the
3 Complaint. Any money not used for such equitable relief is to be deposited to the
4 U.S. Treasury as disgorgement. Stipulating Defendant has no right to challenge
5 any actions the Commission or its representatives may take pursuant to this
6 Subsection.

7 F. The asset freeze is modified to permit the payments/transfers identified in
8 the Monetary Judgment and Partial Suspension Section. Upon completion of
9 those payments/transfers, the asset freeze is dissolved as to Stipulating Defendant.

10 **VI. CUSTOMER INFORMATION**

11 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Stipulating Defendant, his officers,
12 agents, employees, and attorneys, and all other persons in active concert or
13 participation with any of them, who receive actual notice of this Order, whether
14 acting directly or indirectly, are permanently restrained and enjoined from directly
15 or indirectly:

16 A. Failing to provide sufficient customer information to enable the
17 Commission to efficiently administer consumer redress. Stipulating Defendant
18 represents that he has provided this redress information to the Commission. If a
19 representative of the Commission requests in writing any information related to
20

1 redress, Stipulating Defendant must provide it, in the form prescribed by the
2 Commission, within 14 days.

3 B. Disclosing, using, or benefitting from customer information, including the
4 name, address, telephone number, email address, Social Security number, other
5 identifying information, or any data that enables access to a customer's account
6 (including a credit card, bank account, or other financial account), that any
7 Defendant obtained prior to entry of this Order in connection with the sale of any
8 product through a negative option continuity plan; and

9 C. Failing to destroy such customer information in all forms in his possession,
10 custody, or control within 30 days after receipt of written direction to do so from a
11 representative of the Commission.

12 Provided, however, that customer information need not be disposed of, and
13 may be disclosed, to the extent requested by a government agency or required by
14 law, regulation, or court order.

15 **VII. COOPERATION**

16 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Stipulating Defendant must fully
17 cooperate with representatives of the Commission and the Receiver in this case
18 and in any investigation related to or associated with the transactions or the
19 occurrences that are the subject of the Complaint. Stipulating Defendant must
20 provide truthful and complete information, evidence, and testimony. Stipulating

1 Defendant must appear for interviews, discovery, hearings, trials, and any other
2 proceedings that a Commission or Receiver representative may reasonably request
3 upon 10 days written notice, or other reasonable notice, at such places and times
4 as a Commission or Receiver representative may designate, without the service of
5 a subpoena.

6 **VIII. ORDER ACKNOWLEDGMENTS**

7 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Stipulating Defendant obtain
8 acknowledgments of receipt of this Order:

9 A. Stipulating Defendant, within 7 days of entry of this Order, must submit to
10 the Commission an acknowledgment of receipt of this Order sworn under penalty
11 of perjury.

12 B. For 5 years after entry of this Order, Stipulating Defendant for any business
13 that he, individually or collectively with any other Defendant, is the majority
14 owner or controls directly or indirectly, must deliver a copy of this Order to: (1)
15 all principals, officers, directors, and LLC managers and members; (2) all
16 employees, agents, and representatives who participate in conduct related to the
17 subject matter of the Order; and (3) any business entity resulting from any change
18 in structure as set forth in the Section titled Compliance Reporting. Delivery must
19 occur within 7 days of entry of this Order for current personnel. For all others,
20 delivery must occur before they assume their responsibilities.

1 C. From each individual or entity to which Stipulating Defendant delivered a
2 copy of this Order, Stipulating Defendant must obtain, within 30 days, a signed
3 and dated acknowledgment of receipt of this Order.

4 **IX. COMPLIANCE REPORTING**

5 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Stipulating Defendant make timely
6 submissions to the Commission:

7 A. One year after entry of this Order, Stipulating Defendant must submit a
8 compliance report, sworn under penalty of perjury:

9 1. Stipulating Defendant must: (a) identify the primary physical, postal,
10 and email address and telephone number, as designated points of contact, which
11 representatives of the Commission may use to communicate with Stipulating
12 Defendant; (b) identify all of Stipulating Defendant's businesses by all of their
13 names, telephone numbers, and physical, postal, email, and Internet addresses;
14 (c) describe the activities of each business, including the goods and services
15 offered, the means of advertising, marketing, and sales, and the involvement of
16 any other Defendant which Stipulating Defendant must describe if he knows or
17 should know due to his own involvement; (d) describe in detail whether and how
18 Stipulating Defendant is in compliance with each Section of this Order; and
19 (e) provide a copy of each Order Acknowledgment obtained pursuant to this
20 Order, unless previously submitted to the Commission.

1 2. Additionally, Stipulating Defendant must: (a) identify all telephone
2 numbers and all physical, postal, email and Internet addresses, including all
3 residences; (b) identify all business activities, including any business for which
4 Stipulating Defendant performs services whether as an employee or otherwise and
5 any entity in which Stipulating Defendant has any ownership interest; and
6 (c) describe in detail Stipulating Defendant's involvement in each such business,
7 including title, role, responsibilities, participation, authority, control, and any
8 ownership.

9 B. For 10 years after entry of this Order, Stipulating Defendant must submit a
10 compliance notice, sworn under penalty of perjury, within 14 days of any change
11 in the following:

12 1. Stipulating Defendant must report any change in: (a) any designated
13 point of contact; or (b) the structure of any entity that Stipulating Defendant has
14 any ownership interest in or controls directly or indirectly that may affect
15 compliance obligations arising under this Order, including: creation, merger, sale,
16 or dissolution of the entity or any subsidiary, parent, or affiliate that engages in
17 any acts or practices subject to this Order.

18 2. Additionally, Stipulating Defendant must report any change in:
19 (a) name, including aliases or fictitious name, or residence address; or (b) title or
20 role in any business activity, including any business for which Stipulating

1 Defendant performs services whether as an employee or otherwise and any entity
2 in which Stipulating Defendant has any ownership interest, and identify the name,
3 physical address, and any Internet address of the business or entity.

4 C. Stipulating Defendant must submit to the Commission notice of the filing of
5 any bankruptcy petition, insolvency proceeding, or similar proceeding by or
6 against Stipulating Defendant within 14 days of its filing.

7 D. Any submission to the Commission required by this Order to be sworn
8 under penalty of perjury must be true and accurate and comply with 28 U.S.C. §
9 1746, such as by concluding: “I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws
10 of the United States of America that the foregoing is true and correct. Executed
11 on: _____” and supplying the date, signatory’s full name, title (if applicable), and
12 signature.

13 E. Unless otherwise directed by a Commission representative in writing, all
14 submissions to the Commission pursuant to this Order must be emailed to

X. RECORDKEEPING

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Stipulating Defendant must create certain records for 10 years after entry of the Order, and retain each such record for 5 years. Specifically, Stipulating Defendant for any business that Stipulating Defendant, individually or collectively with any other Defendants, is a majority owner or controls directly or indirectly, must create and retain the following records:

A. Accounting records showing the revenues from all goods or services sold;

B. Personnel records showing, for each person providing services, whether as an employee or otherwise, that person's: name; addresses; telephone numbers; job title or position; dates of service; and (if applicable) the reason for termination;

C. Records of all consumer complaints and refund requests, whether received directly or indirectly, such as through a third party, and any response;

D. All records necessary to demonstrate full compliance with each provision of this Order, including all submissions to the Commission; and

E. A copy of each unique advertisement or other marketing material, including Internet and social media advertising or webpages.

1 **XI. COMPLIANCE MONITORING**

2 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that, for the purpose of monitoring
3 Stipulating Defendant's compliance with this Order, including the financial
4 representations upon which part of the judgment was suspended and any failure to
5 transfer any assets as required by this Order:

6 A. Within 14 days of receipt of a written request from a representative of the
7 Commission, Stipulating Defendant must: submit additional compliance reports
8 or other requested information, which must be sworn under penalty of perjury;
9 appear for depositions; and produce documents for inspection and copying. The
10 Commission is also authorized to obtain discovery, without further leave of court,
11 using any of the procedures prescribed by Federal Rules of Civil Procedure 29, 30
12 (including telephonic depositions), 31, 33, 34, 36, 45, and 69.

13 B. For matters concerning this Order, the Commission is authorized to
14 communicate directly with Stipulating Defendant. The Stipulating Defendant may
15 have counsel present. Stipulating Defendant must permit representatives of the
16 Commission to interview any employee or other person affiliated with Stipulating
17 Defendant who has agreed to such an interview. The person interviewed may
18 have counsel present.

19 C. The Commission may use all other lawful means, including posing, through
20 its representatives as consumers, suppliers, or other individuals or entities, to

1 Stipulating Defendant or any individual or entity affiliated with Stipulating
2 Defendant, without the necessity of identification or prior notice. Nothing in this
3 Order limits the Commission's lawful use of compulsory process, pursuant to
4 Sections 9 and 20 of the FTC Act, 15 U.S.C. §§ 49, 57b-1.

5 D. Upon written request from a representative of the Commission, any
6 consumer reporting agency must furnish consumer reports concerning Stipulating
7 Defendant, pursuant to Section 604(1) of the Fair Credit Reporting Act, 15 U.S.C.
8 §1681b(a)(1).

9 **XII. RETENTION OF JURISDICTION**

10 IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that this Court retains jurisdiction of this
11 matter for purposes of construction, modification, and enforcement of this Order.
